

CHW Supervising Provider Requirements FAQ

Questions	Answers
1. Who is a Supervising Provider	 A Supervising Provider is the organization employing or otherwise overseeing the CHW, with which the Managed Care Plan contracts The Supervising Provider must be: A licensed Provider Hospital An outpatient clinic A local health jurisdiction (LHJ), or a community-based organization (CBO) The Supervising Provider does not need to be the same entity as the Provider who made the referral for CHW services but must be vetted by the MCP in order to participate
2. What is the Supervising Provider responsible for?	 The Supervising Provider is responsible for ensuring the provisions of CHW services comply with all applicable requirements The Supervising Provider must provide direct/indirect oversight to CHWs The Supervising Provider must ensure connectivity of CHW with the ordering entity Supervising Providers (the organizations employing or otherwise overseeing the CHWs with which the MCP contracts, as described below) are encouraged to work with CHWs who are familiar with and/or have experience in the geographic communities they are serving. Supervising Providers must maintain evidence of this experience. The Supervising Provider does not need to be the same entity as the Providers do not need to be physically present at the location when CHWs provide services to Members

3. What is the Managed Care Plan (MCP) responsible for?	 Managed Care plans must ensure that the Supervising Providers or Subcontractors, provide covered CHW services to MCP Members and verify adequate supervision and training
4. What is the criteria to operate as a Supervising Provider in a MCP network?	 Enroll as Medi-Cal providers Applicants must apply to enroll in the Medi-Cal program by submitting an electronic application through the Provider Application and Validation for Enrollment (PAVE) online enrollment portal, along with all supporting documentation. Note: CHWs are not required to enroll as a Medi-Cal Providers
5. What additional qualifications must be met by the Provider or Provider Organization required to be considered a Supervising Provider?	 This may include, or not be limited to: Sufficient experience providing similar services Ability to submit claims or invoices using standardized protocols Capability to comply with all reporting and oversight requirements History of fraud, waste, and/or abuse Recent History of criminal activity History of liability claims against the provider
6. What tracking should the Supervising Provider provide?	 Supervising Providers must maintain evidence of, minimum qualifications through one of the following pathways, as determined by the Supervising Provider: CHW Certificate Violence Prevention Professional Certificate Work Experience Pathway The Supervising Provider must maintain evidence of this training. Supervising Providers may provide and/or require additional training, as identified by the Supervising Provider
7. What other requirements are expected from the Supervising Providers?	 Documentation must be accessible to the Supervising Provider upon their request. Members who need multiple ongoing CHW services or continued CHW services after 12 units of services (as defined in the Medi-Cal Provider Manual), require a written care plan from one or more individual licensed providers, which may include the recommending Provider and other licensed Providers affiliated with the CHW Supervising Provider. The Provider ordering the plan of care does not need to be the same Provider who initially recommended CHW services or the Supervising Provider for CHW services

8. What should MCPs consider as CHW Supervising Provider characteristics in their P & Ps:	 MCP's ability to receive referrals from licensed practitioners for CHW benefits MCPs validating Supervising Providers are appropriately assessing CHWs have sufficient experience to provide services Ensuring Supervising Providers have the ability to submit claims or encounters to MCPs using standardized protocols MCPs ensuring Supervising Providers have business licensing that meet industry standards MCP's capability to comply with all reporting and oversight requirements MCP's monitoring processes for fraud, waste, and/or abuse of CHW services MCP's process for monitoring recent history of criminal activity of Supervising Providers MCP's process for monitoring history of liability claims against the Supervising Provider
9. How are CHW services reimbursed?	 Through a CHW Supervising Provider in accordance with its Provider contract, unless reimbursed directly through an MCP if the CHW is a Medi-Cal enrolled Provider Claims for CHW services submitted by the Supervising Provider with allowable current procedural terminology codes as outlined in the Medi-Cal Provider Manual
10. What is considered duplication of CHW services?	 Services that are duplicative to services that are reimbursed through other benefits such as Enhanced Care Management (ECM), which is inclusive of the services within the CHW benefit. Billing for CHW services and ECM for the same member for the same time period ECM CHWs are not eligible to provide services for the CHW benefit
11. Are D-SNP members eligible for CHW services?	• Yes; D-SNP Members would be entitled to Medi-Cal benefits that are not covered under Medicare. Modifiers are used in billing to specify that member is receiving CHW services that are covered under Medi-Cal.
12. Can a CHW refer members over for ECM services?	 CHWs can help connect Members to ECM as part of CHW services. This is a service that can be reimbursed for that work via the CHW Benefit. This is not considered "ECM Outreach" because it is not work being done by an ECM Provider.
